Hillary Don and Mary Eklund Go Down in History





Members of the Landmarks Society gathered at the SS China Cabin on Sunday, November 19th, for the Annual Meeting – one of the best events of the year because it's an opportunity to honor some special people. This year's honorees were Dr. Hillary Don as Honorary Member of the Year and Mary Eklund as Volunteer of the Year.

A former member of the Board of Directors and a past-president of the Landmarks Society, Hillary received honors for his many contributions to preserving the history of the community. Among them, "100 Years Ago," his column for *The Ark*, gives readers a picture into what life was like in Tiburon and Belvedere a century ago. He also was the editor of *Life in Belvedere and Tiburon 1890-1900*, a book compiling newspaper stories from those years, and he contributed a chapter on the Belvedere Golf Club to *A Pictorial History of Belvedere 1890 to 1980*. In addition, with his wife Joan, he helped to preserve the property on Belvedere Island that is now Centennial Park.

Mary Eklund is the hardworking curator who has helped to lovingly restore the stationmaster's family home at the Railroad-Ferry Depot Museum, complete with furniture and household goods from the early 20th century. She conducts both public and private tours at the Depot House Museum, which resembles the home as it was during the years from 1913 to 1940, when stationmaster William Bent and his family, and even a dog, occupied the upstairs apartment. Before taking on duties as curator, Mary was a volunteer at the Archives.

The Annual Meeting also signaled the changing of the guard for the Landmarks Society's Board of Directors. Grateful thanks are in order to retiring board members Don Davis, Anne Kasanin and Diane Lynch for their years of service. After a unanimous vote, Alan Perper officially joined the board as its newest member. Kudos and thanks also go to Jim Allen, Ida Mae Berg and Helen Lindqvist, returning board members who are beginning new terms.

In addition, the long-awaited Fiscal Fitness Fund drawing was a highlight of the Annual Meeting. Jim Allen won the bench at the Landmarks Art & Garden Center, and Dr. and Mrs. R.H. Connors won an autographed copy of *Tiburon, A California Railroad Town*.

Our 2006 Landmarks Season came to a close on October 29th with more than 4,500 visitors enjoying our sites this year. They come from our local area and from around the world. To thank our loyal docents and volunteers for giving our visitors a memorable experience, we held a reception to thank them on November 16th. It was a great time for the whole volunteer group, as they traded stories and experiences from their sites.

Speaking of great times, we held our first Great Pumpkin Festival on October 29th at the Art & Garden Center. Children and adults had fun with face painting, stickers and pumpkin decorating. The town's finest pumpkin carvers displayed their skills and the youngsters judged the entries.

We also completed our second year of participating in Friday Nights on Main. Our Landmarks table was a popular spot with historical books and photographs for sale, eye-catching displays and all kinds of information.

In the new year, we will be hosting students from Reed Union School District at the Railroad-Ferry Depot Museum as part of their studies of town history. This will be one of our largest group efforts with some 140 students visiting in one week. In addition, January marks the 100th anniversary of the incorporation of the Northwestern Pacific Railroad. We will join with the Northwestern Pacific Railroad Historical Society and the Native Sons of the Golden West in commemorating this milestone event.

The Old St. Hilary's Concert Series has a new look this season with a variety of entertainers. The first concert, on November 9, featured the Itchy Mountain Men and Christine Donaldson, who played to a packed house. The next event is on December 19, when we will feature the unique singing of Musae, the young women's chorus. Get your tickets early for this one, as we had standing room only when they performed in 2005.

During the winter off-season, we are still busy working on our sites, preparing for the opening in April 2007. The activities include repairs, painting and museum enhancements. In addition, we are finalizing



programs for 2007, such as concerts, a community musical, school tours and other events. And we are continuing to build our team of docents. If you haven't experienced the fun and learning of being a docent at our sites, consider trying it out next year.

Above all, I thank you for your support of the Landmarks Society this year and look forward to an even more exciting 2007.

At the Archives

Dave Gotz and Jack Fiorito spent a day filming and interviewing Dr. Richard Hahn in his historically significant Rey Home on Golden Gate Avenue. This is the first time anyone has documented this National Historic Belvedere home to this extent.

The Archives has established an Historical Collections Fund, named The Robert and Beverly Bastian Fund, by combining several funds with a common purpose designated for the conservation and acquisition of art, artifacts and related ephemera.

Two Esther C. Meyer etchings sold at Clars Gallery Auction. This new venue sells works by Esther Meyer that are not part of our permanent collection. Two more will be in the November auction.

The Artist as Historian Collection recently received an estate bequest of two significant paintings of Belvedere. One is of Beach Road, by Cooke, and shows the Belvedere Hotel. The second, a Wisby painting, depicts the Belvedere golf course, Richardson Bay and Mount Tamalpais.

Belvedere resident and Landmarks Society member Richard Snyder is currently photographing the Artist as Historian Collection. Richard has the skill and equipment to create archivalquality digital files of our outstanding fine art collection.

Piper Berger attended an all-day class at the Computer History Museum in Mountain View. The subject offered by the Society of American Archivists & Society of California Archivists was "Describing Archives: A Content Standard," the new U.S. standard.

Old St. Hilary's Concerts

Music is in the air. The concert series at Old St. Hilary's is off and running for another season. On Thursday, November 9, the Itchy Mountain Men - Joe " Snuffy" Morais (mandolin and vocals), Ben "String Bean" Margolin (acoustic bass), Ricky "Slick Rick" Meier (banjo) and Roger "Stretch" Krakow (guitar and vocals) were the headliners, as lovers of bluegrass and blues filled Old St. Hilary's. Christine Donaldson, a talented young blues vocalist from Tiburon rounded out the program with soulful songs.

At the request of the band, Jack Fiorito shared the history of Old St. Hilary's and the Landmarks Society with the audience and introduced the band, whose members expressed appreciation for the opportunity to perform in a beautiful place noted for its excellent acoustics.

Next on the concert calendar is Musae, a young women's chorus, which includes Tiburon's Maggie Lukens. Last year's holiday concert was standing room only, so get your tickets early. They are available at the Landmarks Society Office, Tiburon Town Hall, the Attic on Lower Ark Row and at the door. You also can purchase tickets from the Landmarks Office (435-1853) with a credit card, and we'll hold your tickets at Will Call on the evening of the performance.

The Del Mar Middle School orchestras, whose classes are funded by the Foundation for Reed Schools, will be performing on a date to be announced in March, and music teachers and professional musicians Kit Eakle of Reed School and Jeb Gist of Bel Aire will be on the playbill in April.


